Electrical installation and equipment	Electric shock and burns	<ul> <li>Regular visual checks for damage to installations, including hook ups and equipment</li> <li>Electrical testing and inspection reports up-to- date, in compliance with site licence conditions</li> <li>Work undertaken by competent person conversant with statutory requirements eg NICEIC or ECA contractor.</li> <li>Isolation of abandoned pitches</li> <li>Regular Residual Current Device (RCD) checks</li> </ul>	
Overhead electric cables	Electrocution	<ul> <li>Overhead lines insulated, anti climb devices fitted.</li> <li>Warning notices displayed</li> <li>Advice given to site users</li> </ul> For further information see: <ul> <li>Overhead power lines on HSE website</li> <li>Tents and caravans on Electricity Northwest website</li> </ul>

LPG storage	Gas leak/ explosion/fire	<ul> <li>Compound for storage of new and used gas cylinders</li> <li>Suitably sited - away from buildings and drain gullies.</li> <li>Kept locked</li> <li>Free from overgrown vegetation</li> <li>Adequate size to meet site requirements (no stacking of cylinders)</li> <li>No cylinder storage outside the cage</li> <li>Warning signage displayed</li> <li>No smoking</li> </ul> For further information see:

Pedestrian safety	<ul> <li>slips and trips</li> <li>collision with vehicles</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Maintain access roads and footpaths in good repair</li> <li>Speed limits imposed</li> <li>Pedestrian routes clearly marked</li> <li>Provide handrails to steps</li> <li>Lighting of footways as necessary</li> <li>Clearly marked road system</li> <li>Separate pedestrians from vehicles where possible         <ul> <li>(See link below to workplace transport safety checklist)</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	
Traffic routes	Vehicles - collision	<ul> <li>Clearly marked traffic route, no obstructions</li> <li>Speed limit applied</li> <li>Adequate road width or one-way system in place</li> </ul> See workplace transport safety inspection checklist on the HSE website.

Topic Area	Example Hazards	Example control measures
Floors	Slips/trips	<ul> <li>Slip resistant flooring</li> <li>Adequate cleaning procedures</li> <li>Signage for wet/slippery floors</li> </ul> See slips and trips on the HSE website for further information.
Water temperature	Scalding from hot water	<ul><li>Thermostatic control valves at water outlets</li><li>Warning signage</li></ul>
Legionella	Legionella risk	<ul> <li>Boiler maintenance according to manufacturers instructions</li> <li>Run all showers and other fittings weekly to avoid water stagnating</li> <li>Dismantle and clean shower heads at least quarterly</li> <li>Remove redundant pipework</li> <li>Keep water cisterns covered, insulated and free of debris</li> </ul> See Legionella and Legionnaires' disease on the <u>HSE website</u> for further information.
Laundry room	Electric shock/physical injury	<ul> <li>Ensure safety of electrical equipment</li> <li>Interlocks fitted to washing machines, dryers and so on.</li> <li>See NALI (National Association of the Launderette Industry for guidance for launderettes.</li> </ul>

Topic Area	Example Hazards	Example control measures
Play Areas	Slips, trips and falls	<ul> <li>Regular safety checks of equipment and surrounding area</li> <li>Suitable floor surface material, replaced or repaired as necessary</li> <li>Safe access route to the playground</li> <li>Exclusion of animals</li> <li>Safety signage displayed for example: supervision by parents, age restrictions / zones.</li> </ul> See Play Safety Advice and Information on the RoSPA website for further information.
Spa Pools / Hot Tubs	Legionella Risk of other infections	<ul> <li>Staff training in pool management</li> <li>Effective water treatment</li> <li>Water sampling programme</li> <li>Instructions to users</li> </ul> See Legionella and Legionnaires' disease the HSE website for further information.

#### Asbestos

Areas to consider for potential hazards for asbestos containing material		
Topic Area	Example Hazards	Example control measures
Asbestos containing material	Asbestos related disease	<ul> <li>Find out whether there are any materials containing asbestos on the site and, if so, where it is and what condition it is in. If in doubt, materials must be presumed to contain asbestos;</li> <li>assess the risk and</li> <li>make a plan to manage that risk and act on it.</li> </ul> See the duty to manage asbestos on the HSE website for guidance.

Topic Area	Example Hazards	Example control measures
Grounds Maintenance	Chemical poisoning	<ul> <li>Safe use of grass cutting and other equipment</li> <li>Trained staff</li> <li>Equipment maintenance</li> </ul> See Pesticides on the HSE website for further information.
	Physical injury	<ul> <li>Safe use of grass cutting and other equipment</li> <li>Trained staff</li> <li>Equipment maintenance</li> </ul> See Pesticides on the HSE website for further information.
